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
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# Journeys of Hope & Perseverance .....



Every person and family who walks through our doors is on a unique journey. To provide them with support, we focus on creating solutions specific to their most critical needs with the following programs:

# **Hope House—Transitional Housing**

Hope House is the first American home for up to 13 adult asylum seekers at any given time. As each resident develops goals, we work to support them with one-on-one guidance and cultural and educational activities in a warm, family-like environment.

# **Hope House English Language Program (HHELP)**

HHELP offers the opportunity for adult English learners to develop and practice their English language skills. We are continuing with remote classes, along with in-person tutoring, cultural outings and small conversation groups.

# **Asylum Seeker Assistance Program (ASAP)**

ASAP continues to evolve and grow to meet our clients' most urgent needs:

- **Basic needs:** One-on-one assistance to individuals and families to help them access much-needed food, housing, healthcare and many other resources.
- Work permits: Working with clients to submit their applications to legally work in the U.S.
- NEW Asylum Application Resource Center (AARC) at the Portland Public Library: Resources for asylum seekers to work on their asylum applications in a safe environment with interpreters and in-language instructions.





# **Young Mother Shows Determination for Son**

Dee\* first arrived in the United States in 2021 as a young mother with a new baby. She made the difficult decision to leave her parents, siblings, and extended family in Africa to seek asylum to help keep her child safe.

Upon arrival, like so many newcomers, she faced the challenge of finding a home in a limited housing market, and she didn't speak English. Dee knew she needed help.

After hearing about Hope Acts through a friend, Dee received the support she needed to find a space, furnishings, and other housing essentials. She now works with a Housing Mentor, assigned to her through Hope Acts, to help her build a life in Portland with her son.
